A New Dream for Mumtaz

Both of Mumtaz's parents are leprosy patients. However, her father died of tuberculosis 6 years ago leaving behind a shocked family who did not even know about his disease. Mumtaz now lives with her mother along with her brother's family. Mumtaz wanted to be a nurse but did not qualify for the course. She was very disappointed as she wanted to financially help her mother who gets a monthly pension of INR 800 (USD 19). She was depressed but her mother encouraged her to join the HOPE *foundation* computer training centre. She is happy now that she has another career path to pursue which she could not have afforded on her own.



Old Age Support

The Old Age Support programme has helped 76 senior citizens with leprosy. It is even more difficult for them to support themselves as they are social outcasts and their families are not willing to help them. HOPE *foundation* helps them by providing them with daily sustenance.

Giving Devender the Gift of Health

When he was only 2 years old, Devender was affected by polio. One of the most vivid memories of his childhood is not being able to play with his friends because of his disability. As he was already weakened by polio, he contracted tuberculosis. Though he started the treatment at a hospital, he could not complete the treatment because of poverty and a lack of awareness about the disease. His condition worsened and he could not even walk. His friend suggested that he seek treatment at the Village of HOPE. The HOPE DOTS centre helped him with medicine and nutritious food. After 6 months of such treatment, he is now able to come to the centre himself to collect his medicines. He is extremely thankful to HOPE foundation for giving him back his health as his tuberculosis tests now show no sign of the disease.

GE-Money Financial Literacy Course

This quarter, 32 students completed the GE-Money Financial Literacy Program successfully. Many of the students visited a bank and an ATM for the first time in their lives. There were also 79 new enrolments. Some of the new students were from the computer and sewing classes. Every batch feels that this is a very effective course, which helps them learn how to handle money diligently.
